Ask and tell. ... 2. Take dictation. ... 3. Try and try again. ... 4. Step onto the stage. ... 5. Create story prompts. ... 6. Go from wordless to wordy. ... 7. Let her take the lead. ... 8. Offer a helping hand. 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Ask and tell. The parent can ask a series of leading questions that get them to think about the three important aspects: beginning, conflict and action, and resolution. When did this story take place?" or "What is the most important event in the story?" 2. Prompt creativity with questions such as "What is [this character] thinking?" or "What sound does that make?" Be sure to allow ample time for the child to answer.

Children will use notes to add ideas to their stories; , reading aloud their writing and inviting listeners to critique it by asking, "What did you like about the story?" or "Is there anything that you would take out of the story?"</p>

Use story prompts.</p> <p>Gather magazine pictures that feature character types, locations, and key objects and actions that play a role in the story. Cut them out and glue them to index cards. Then use the cards as a basis for writing.</p>
